## MATH

### **Basic Math: 10:35-11:25 (Grades 5-7) Mrs. Grandpré**

Basic math is a review of concepts, such as addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of decimals. It also includes factors, rounding, divisibility rules, greatest common factor, least common multiple, fractions, and other concepts based on the needs of the class. This class is for advanced 5<sup>th</sup> grade students through remedial 7<sup>th</sup> grade students.

### **Extreme Math: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 5-8) Mrs. Cheney**

Extreme sports are all the rage today. We are taking these sports and turning them into learning. We will learn about fractions, decimals, multi-step problem solving, charts and graphs, percentages, conversions, and averaging. We will do experiments and projects that help us apply what we are learning. Join us for a math thrill ride of learning. This class is for advanced 5<sup>th</sup> grade students and those who enjoy sports and math.

### **Fractions, Decimals, & Percents: 8:30-9:20 (Grades 4-6) Mrs. Grandpré**

This class will review the concepts of fractions, decimals, and percents both as a hands-on experience and through the use of worksheets for concept drill. We will have a math fun day once a week. This class is for advanced 4<sup>th</sup> grade students through remedial 6<sup>th</sup> grade students.

### **Fun with Numbers: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 1-3) Mrs. Alford**

In this class, students will use several types of problems to address the basic operations of math. This class will be filled with exciting activities introducing math in a fun and interactive way. Students will play games, solve puzzles, and practice skills independently and in small groups. All of this is done in a stress-free environment without the pressure of tests or grades.

### **Picturing Math: 10:35-11:25 (Grades 2-4) Miss Crockett**

Candy, coloring supplies, money, art books, rice cookers, pattern blocks, graph paper, golf balls, gumdrops, marshmallows, scavenger hunts, literature books, and quilting squares to do math? Picturing Math is a unique class that uses popular children's books and hands-on activities to teach math concepts. Each activity focuses on a particular book and math concept. Subjects covered include problem solving, geometry, measurement, simple algebra, and probability. Excite students by combining literature and activities with mathematics! (Covers NCTM, National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, math standards.)

**Pre-algebra: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 6–8) Mrs. Wendy Grandpré**

Pre-algebra explores and reviews concepts, such as order of operations adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing signed numbers (integers). It also includes proportions, solving one and two-step equations, and other concepts, based on the needs of the class.

**The Stock Market Game: 10:35-11:25 (Grades 5–8) Mrs. Cheney**

Financial decisions leave many adults feeling overwhelmed and confused. We are going to learn, at an early age, how to take care of our money and invest for the future. This is a simulation-based class where we “play the market” to learn about business ownership, investing in the stock market, how to balance a checkbook, understanding rate of return, and other financial terms, all by playing a month long game. These skills will help them make decisions on 401Ks and private investing when they grow up, but they won’t even realize they are learning while playing the game.

**Time Travel Math: 8:30-9:20 (Grades 4–6) Mrs. Cheney**

What does math have to do with the Egyptians or artists like Leonardo da Vinci? Find out by joining us as we go on an exciting adventure through time, while learning advanced geometry concepts. We will use geometry skills to solve math mysteries throughout history. We will learn about angles, symmetry, measuring, area, and more through art, projects, and worksheets. Don’t get left behind! This class is for advanced 4<sup>th</sup> graders and 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade students who enjoy math.

**Word Problems? No Problem! 10:35-11:25 (Grades 5–8) Mrs. Alford**

In this class, students will use word problems to address the concepts needed to master fractions, decimals, percentages, as well as the four basic operations. This class would be beneficial to those who struggle in these areas of math, as well as anyone who simply needs to sharpen these skills in an environment without the pressure of tests or grades.

## LANGUAGE ARTS

**Classroom Drama: 11:30-12:20 (Grades 4–8) Mrs. Grandpré**

This class will teach students how to better present themselves, using dramatic speech. During the class, students will be able to participate in improvisation and drama games, creative drama, choral reading, script reading, and possibly puppetry. Students will prepare a reader’s theater presentation for the final day of summer school.

**First Grade Readiness: 8:30-9:20 (Grade 1) Miss Shiplett**

Reinforce skills learned in kindergarten. Phonics, addition, subtraction, graphing, and sorting! Skills will be taught through the use of manipulatives, games, videos, and more.

**Phonics Fun: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 1–2) Miss Crockett**

Through systematic, explicit instruction, students will learn to think about words in terms of component sounds so that decoding will make sense and spelling will come more easily. The use of the Phonics Game and other hands-on activities will allow students to grasp more complex concepts to become better readers and spellers.

**Reader’s Theater and So Much More! 8:30-9:20 (Grades 3–5) Miss Crockett**

Humorous skits and plays are a jumping off place for research and creativity for all students. These skits not only provide a reason for students to reread text and practice fluency but also promote cooperative interaction, as well as writing, vocabulary development, crafts, mathematics, and comprehension skills.

**Reading for Understanding: 8:30-9:20 (Grades 2–4) Mrs. Alford**

In this class, students will read and listen to stories in order to enhance reading comprehension skills. These selections will draw from many subject areas, including both fiction and nonfiction. This class will be filled with exciting activities, such as games, role playing, art, and various written exercises. Several comprehension strategies will be presented, which will increase understanding.

**Write What You See: 11:30-12:20 (Grades 4–8) Mrs. Ottaviano**

Imagination is a powerful force, but sometimes imagination needs a little help to get it going. That is when photography can be useful in the classroom. Starting off, students will use photographs as writing prompts to develop expository pieces, analysis, comparison, and contrast, while learning the process for organizing writing. As the students learn more about photography, they will progress to taking their own photographs and writing about what they see. The possibilities for using photographs to stimulate writing are endless and will certainly help to overcome any reluctance that students may have about writing. Besides learning about photography, creative group work and role playing are also methods to engage and stimulate imagination.

## COOKING

**American Grub: 11:30-12:20 (Grades 3–5) Miss Crockett**

Learn how to cook famous recipes from different parts of the United States while learning about those states: the geography, the agriculture, nicknames, capital cities, landscapes, culture, etc. Take this great journey across the U.S. and get to know our country. All recipes will be compiled in a special cookbook to enjoy for years to come. **Class Fee: \$15**

**Aprons Ready! 9:25-10:15 (Grades 1–3) Mrs. Ottaviano**

Kids love to mimic adults, especially when it comes to cooking. This class is the perfect way to get kids actively involved in cooking and making healthy food choices while stirring up some tasty fun in your home kitchen! Students will learn the proper way to handle utensils and prepare recipes. **Class Fee: \$15**

**Fun with Food: 10:35-11:25 (Grades 1–2) Mrs. Butcher**

Want to learn kitchen techniques and ideas for making fun snacks and treats? Come join us and learn recipes to share with your family and friends. **Class Fee: \$15**

## THINKING SKILLS

### **Lollipop Logic: 11:30-12:20 (Grades 1–2) Mrs. Cheney**

Do you remember how hard word problems were in school? We will be learning all of the things that make word problems hard: like sequencing, problem solving, pattern decoding, and deductive reasoning, using fun, hands on activities. We will do projects, make snacks, and play games, all while learning math skills that they need for the rest of their educational careers. Join us and build essential critical thinking skills.

### **One Hour Mysteries: 10:35-11:25 (Grades 4–8) Mrs. Ottaviano**

Students will enjoy becoming detectives as they discover “who done it” and solve the crimes. Student detectives will investigate suspects, their alibis and motives, in addition to other clues to eliminate the suspects until the guilty culprit is found. While using deductive reasoning skills, the students will learn to take notes, organize data, and analyze evidence in a classroom forensic lab. As students solve the mysteries, they will acquire many reading and thinking skills. Happy sleuthing!

### **Strategies for Successful Students: 11:30-12:20 (Grades 4–6) Mrs. Alford**

In this class, students will learn many ways to enhance study skills. The lessons will be filled with activities, such as textbook attack, memorization strategies, outlining, and various sensory exercises. The students will acquire ideas for using several different modalities and learning styles. Students will discover that learning can be fun, as well as profitable.

### **The Case of the Missing Lunch: 10:35-11:25 (Grades 3–5) Mrs. Schoeppner**

This class will introduce students to scientific observation and analysis by solving the mystery of the missing cookies and chocolate milk. Students will use forensics to help Stacy Ramirez find her lunch by examining the crime scene, doing analysis of evidence, and testing the mysterious powder left at the scene.

### **The Chocolate Caper: 11:30-12:20 (Grades 5–8) Mrs. Schoeppner**

This class will be using logic to help the students solve a mystery created just for them. The students will be able to solve puzzles and decode secret messages to be able to eliminate suspects, one by one, until only the culprit remains and the mystery is solved.

### **The Detective Club: 8:30-9:20 (Grades 2–4) Mrs. Ottaviano**

This class is intended to lead young students to discover the excitement of being a detective. Each time they successfully solve a mystery, they will be eager to tackle the next one. While solving the mysteries, students will gather clues through decoding a message, sorting information, solving logic puzzles, and using inferential thinking. Watch their confidence grow along with their problem solving abilities: organizing clues, combining and analyzing data, using deductive reasoning, and using the process of elimination.

## ART AND MUSIC

### **Bead Fun: 8:30-9:20 (Grades 1–3) Mrs. Butcher**

Beads are used to make all kinds of fun jewelry and crafts. Come join the summer fun as creativity and bead fun abounds! **Class Fee: \$15**

### **Crafty Creations: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 1–3) Mrs. Jones**

Learn how to make fun, simple crafts that will help unlock your inner creativity. **Class Fee: \$15**

### **Jewelry Making: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 5–8) Mrs. Butcher**

Children will learn how to use tools to craft interesting jewelry as they also learn different techniques to create all sorts of fun jewelry projects! **Class Fee: \$15**

### **Mini-Musical Drama: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 1–5) Miss Ferguson**

If you love to sing and perform, this class is for you! From set decoration to memorizing lines and putting on a show, the instruction from this class will also work on teamwork, group collaboration, creativity, personal and interpersonal skills, and communication skills. Students will perform at the summer school finale.

### **Perfecting Your Penmanship: 11:30-12:20 (Grades 1–3) Mrs. Jones**

Explore the art of letters by writing the alphabet and using correct spacing and technique.

### **Smart Art: 10:35-11:25 (Grades 4–8) Mrs. Jones**

Enhance current skills and art techniques through the use of various mediums. **Class Fee: \$15**

### **Writing in Style: 8:30-9:20 (Grades 5–8) Mrs. Jones**

Calligraphy is a means of expressing an emotion and creating a mood through a word or phrase with a stroke of a pen. **Class Fee: \$15**

## SPORTS AND FITNESS

### **Basketball: 10:35-11:25 (Grades 4–8) Mr. Adkins**

Students will learn the skills of basketball taught from a DVD series, entitled *BetterBasketball.com*. Students will learn dribbling, passing, and shooting skills, as well as game rules and strategies. Classes will begin with warm-ups and exercises. Everything will be taught from a Christian point of view. Scripture verses will be used to reinforce sportsmanship, character, and values. Students will receive a good experience with a big dose of fun. No special equipment required, but basketball shoes would be recommended.

### **Fitness & Fun: 8:30-9:20 (Grades 3–8) Mr. Williams**

Come join a fun-filled 50 minutes of exercise! You won't be bored doing the same old exercises. This class is all about getting out and doing something different every day. Activities include Frisbee golf, soccer, basketball, and more!

### **Flag Football: 10:35-11:25 (Grades 4–8) Mr. Williams**

Are you a future football star? This class will teach you all of the rules of football and the skills you need to help you in the future. Sign up and show off your touchdown celebration dance!

**Gymnastics: 10:35-11:25 and 11:30-12:20 (Grades 1–8) Mr. Shiplett and Miss Shiplett**

Students will learn a variety of introductory to intermediate skills in the disciplines of artistic, acrobatic, and team gymnastics. Students will focus on building strength and flexibility, as well as teamwork, trust, and self-control. Students will be learning such events as Bars, Beam, Vault, Floor, Rings, and more. At the end of the fourth week, students will showcase the skills each of them has learned at the summer school finale.

**Soccer: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 4–8) Mr. Adkins**

Indoor soccer will be taught, including basic skills, such as passing, trapping, heading, and shooting. Game rules, positions, and strategy will also be covered. Classes will begin with warm-up exercise and stretching. Everything will be taught from a Christian point of view. Scriptures will be used to reinforce sportsmanship, character, and values. Students will receive a good experience with a healthy dose of fun. Cleats are not required as we will be indoors, but soccer socks and shin pads are recommended.

**Volleyball: 8:30-9:20 (Grades 4–8) Mr. Adkins**

Students will learn the five basic skills for use in the game of volleyball: passing (bumping), setting, spiking, blocking, and serving. This class will also cover game rules and strategy. Classes will begin with warm-up exercises and stretches. Everything will be taught from a Christian point of view. Scripture verses will be used to reinforce sportsmanship, character, and values. Students will receive a good experience with a big dose of fun. Knee pads are the only special items required.

**Water Bottle Bat Ball: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 3–8) Mr. Williams**

Tired of waiting until school starts to play water bottle bat ball? Maybe you're in middle school and you miss the good ol' days of WBBB. Don't torture yourself anymore. Come have some fun playing each day! So sign up and smack that ball!

**Wrestling: 11:30-12:20 (Grades 1–8) Mr. Williams**

Are you interested in knowing what real wrestling is all about? This class will teach you the rules and techniques of the world's oldest sport. Come have fun and wrestle your friends on the mat.

## **SCIENCE AND COMPUTER**

**Computer: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 3–5) Miss Shiplett**

Students will explore the basics of using a computer. A variety of computer skills and experiences will be taught. Office 2000 (Word, PowerPoint, and Publisher) will be introduced, as well as typing and internet skills. Students will also have an opportunity to explore educational games online.

**Notions about Oceans: 11:30-12:20 (Grades 3–5) Miss Ferguson**

Are you fascinated by the creatures that live in the oceans of the world? Do you have your own notions about oceans? This class is all about oceanography and the interesting creatures that God has created. Experiments, dissections, crafts, art, DVDs, and writing activities are all included in this hands-on approach to learning all about oceans. **Class Fee: \$5**

**Sketch Up 3D, Computer: 8:30-9:20 (Grades 5–8) Mr. Shiplett**

Sketch Up 3D is an introduction into Google Sketch Up 8 3D modeling software. Students will be learning to use this program to design three dimensional shapes and objects such as tools, furniture, and even buildings. With this powerful program and good imagination the possibilities are endless.

**Water Works: 8:30-9:20 (Grades 1–2) Mrs. Schoeppner**

Higher-level thinking challenges 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grade students as they engage in close observations and experimentation about water. Students receive an inquiry-based approach to studying science through hands-on exploration of water.

**X-Treme X-Periments: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 4–8) Mr. Shiplett**

Students will observe and participate in several hands-on experiments in a fun and safe environment. We will attempt to unlock some of the mysteries of aerodynamics, magnetism, electricity, and much more. Some of the experiments we will be conducting will be "The Electric Pickle," "Hover Board," and "Water Rocket." **Class Fee: \$10**

## **SOCIAL STUDIES**

**Babysitting Club: 8:30-9:20 (Grades 5–8) Miss Ferguson**

Are you looking to earn some extra money? Do you love children? Learn what it means to be a babysitter. Class instruction will include: first aid, recipes that children will love, games to play to entertain the little ones, and working with children. So come join the club!

**Bible Fun: 11:30-12:20 (Grades 1–3) Mrs. Butcher**

Learn about different characters from the Bible and the lessons that can be applied to each of our lives today. Analyze, synthesize, and evaluate characters' roles in God's plan as each student discovers God's plan for each of them. Through crafts and projects, students share what they have learned as they recall what God has done.

**Children Around the World: 10:35-11:25 (Grades 1–4) Miss Ferguson**

Travel around the world and experience the art, music, language, food, and culture of a different people group each week. From Africa to Asia, South America to Europe, and beyond, the instruction from this class will equip and challenge students to discover the joy of diversity in God's World.

**Jury Trials in the Classroom: 9:25-10:15 (Grades 5–8) Mrs. Schoeppner**

Students will work together to understand the country's judicial system as they put various fairy tale characters on trial such as the Big Bad Wolf vs. the Three Little Pigs.

# HOW TO REGISTER

**REGISTRATION BEGINS MONDAY, MAY 23**

**WHERE:** Register at the main campus.

**WHEN:** Monday—Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Each class has limited enrollment. Registering early will ensure space for your child.

**HOW:** Complete the registration form and child's class schedule on the attached page. *Full tuition for each class and class fees must be paid at registration.* We accept major credit cards.

**TUITION:** First class – \$59; second class – \$54; third-fourth classes – \$49 each.

**Any cancellations must be made before Monday, June 20 in order to receive a full refund.**

**All classes are limited to 15 students unless otherwise noted.**

## BASIC INFORMATION

- No class changes can be made after the first Friday of summer school (July 8) and no class material fees will be refunded.
- Students should report directly to their assigned rooms for class. At the end of class, they will be released from their rooms to go on to their next class or to be picked up to go home. Younger students may need help to get to their next class if they are new to our campus. Teachers will be sensitive to students who need assistance between classes during the first week. Parents, please let teachers know if your child will need assistance.
- Classes are 50 minutes in length beginning at 8:30 a.m. There will be a five-minute passing period between classes so students may change classrooms.
- Students enrolled in Peach Factory will need to go immediately to their assigned Peach Factory room after their classes are completed each day.
- There will be a 15 minute recess/snack break each day from 10:15—10:30 a.m. During this time, staff will supervise the playground. Students may play, use the restroom, and/or eat a snack from home or purchase a snack from the cafeteria. At 10:30 a.m., a whistle will blow to let students know to go to their next class.
- Shorts and t-shirts may be worn to Summer Learning classes, but they must be modest and appropriate.
- Grading reports are not part of the Summer Learning program because the summer session is relatively short. A letter can be written with a course description and proof of attendance when a written request is made by the parent prior to the last week of summer school.
- Parents should arrange to pick up their children no later than 12:30 if the child has an 11:30 class. After 12:30, students will be sent to Peach Factory and parents will be charged.
- The Summer School Finale with performances and a showcase of student work will be Friday, July 29.
