

# 2021/2022 MIDDLE SCHOOL HANDBOOK

Families who enroll agree with the terms and provisions set forth in the Desert Christian Schools handbook.

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#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

#### **OUR PURPOSE**

The goal of Desert Christian Middle School (DCMS) is to provide a caring, student oriented, Christ-centered setting for enthusiastic and cooperative young people in the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades.

#### **PRINCIPAL**

Mrs. Lisa Costello is the *elementary and* middle school principal. She has been at Desert Christian Schools since 2004. Her other ministry experience includes roles as a Children's Director for a local church and a supplemental instructor for Antelope Valley College.

Mrs. Costello holds a Bachelor's degree in history from California State University, Northridge and holds a Master's degree in Educational Leadership from Grand Canyon University. She holds a Professional Administrative Teaching Certificate from the Association of Christian Schools International.

Mrs. Costello and her husband Jeff have one daughter, Elizabeth.

#### **COMMUNICATION**

DCS publishes a monthly newsletter, Knightly News, which is e-mailed. The Knightly News includes information about upcoming programs and special events and is one avenue of communication with parents. Parents are requested to thoroughly read each newsletter.

Parents may access student grades via FACTS. Please see the information regarding ParentsWeb in the general section of the handbook. Classroom teachers have email accounts that are checked daily. Email addresses can be accessed through FACTS. The primary source for communication to parents regarding academics and discipline is FACTS, our internet-based information system. DCS uses FACTS to e-mail timely notifications to parents. Because of this it is <u>essential</u> that parents update <u>any</u> changes to e-mail addresses and regularly check their child's grades on FACTS.

Meetings with teachers should be scheduled as an appointment as this gives teachers an opportunity to devote attention and resources to answering parent questions.

Parents may not come onto campus without an appointment.

#### **CAMPUS PROCEDURES**

#### **SCHOOL HOURS**

School hours for middle school students are *8:00 a.m. to 2:15 p.m.* Office hours are *7:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.* The telephone number is 661-723-0665.

#### ARRIVAL AND DEPARTURE

Desert Christian Schools values the safety of your child and because of that; students are not allowed to take UBER, LYFT, or any other ride service to and from school. These drivers are not supposed to transport passengers under the age of 18 without an accompanying adult.

Students may not be on campus before 7:30 a.m. or after 2:30 p.m. unless they are participating in an organized school activity. All other students on campus before or after regular school hours must attend Peach Factory, the before and after school care program.

# STUDENT PICK-UP

The following procedures are intended to promote safety and accountability for students. Please review the guidelines with your students to help reinforce safe procedures for student dropoff and pick-up.

Middle School Campus Procedure:

- If there are changes in pick up or transportation plans for a student, the office should be notified before 1:30 p.m. so there is adequate time to inform the student.
- If a student needs to be picked up prior to school dismissal, parents must sign the student out at the main campus office. If the student returns to school the same day, he/she must receive a pass from the office before returning to class.
- Middle school students are released from campus on their own at the end of school. Students must exit the campus at the middle school entrance gate unless they are reporting directly to Peach Factory.

- If a student remains on campus without parent supervision past 2:30 p.m., the student will be admitted to the Peach Factory program and the parents will be charged accordingly. (See General Section for detailed information.)
- Parents are expected to always be punctual in picking up their students from school events, practices, and detentions.
- Parents who are more than ten minutes late to pick up their students may be charged a \$10 fee for any portion of the first ten minutes they are late and \$1 for each additional minute plus any additional Peach Factory charges. The student of the late parent will not be allowed to practice or participate in any events until the late fee has been paid.

#### TELEPHONE USAGE

The student telephone in the middle school office is available for use by students before school, at break, at lunch, and after school with a staff member's permission.

Students will be expected to provide a reason for calling before permission is granted, and permission may be granted at the discretion of school staff members. Students may not use the phone to make preemptive calls to home when facing discipline at school. Students who call home for reasons other than stated when given permission may be subject to school discipline.

When calling into the middle school office to get a message to your student, be sure to do so before 1:00 p.m. in order for the message to be delivered to your student before the end of the day.

# STUDENT VISITATION

Students from another school visiting classes with a DCMS student must first be approved by the administration.

The visiting student's parent or supervising adult must submit a Visiting Student form at least 24 hours in advance and agree to be available in case of emergency or misbehavior by the visiting student.

#### **LOCKERS AND LOCKS**

Each student is provided a locker. Following are some guidelines for using school lockers:

- Students must purchase their own lock from the office and are 100% responsible for its proper use.
- The school is not responsible for missing or damaged locks.
- Students may not share lock combinations with other students.
- Students may not switch lockers.
- Students must not attempt to open any locker that has not been assigned to them.
- Students must not tamper with locks or lockers.
- Students must not abuse lockers by writing on them, applying stickers, or damaging locker mechanisms.
- The school is not responsible for items missing from lockers.
- Students must not store items that are not allowed on campus in their lockers.

#### STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

A goal of the school is to introduce students to Jesus Christ and help them grow in a relationship with Him. Not all students will embrace a personal Christian faith. However, all students are expected to behave according to Christian standards.

Students must show openness to considering Christ as their life leader. This is primarily demonstrated through proper behavior and positive attitudes that are in harmony with Christ's teachings. A verse of scripture that emphasizes this thought is I Timothy 4:12, "Let no one look down on your youthfulness, but rather in speech, conduct, love, faith, and purity, show yourself an example of those who believe."

#### **CONDUCT AT ALL TIMES**

Students must at all times, while enrolled at DCMS, refrain from involvement in the following:

 Possession, use, or sale of any substances used to create a psychoactive reaction (get high), illegal drugs, alcoholic beverages, tobacco, or any nicotine substances (this includes smokeless tobacco, electronic and vapor cigarettes).

- Involvement in immoral or illegal activities.
- Participating in the occult or witchcraft.
- Swearing, using inappropriate language, viewing or sharing pornography, or other communication unbecoming to a Christian.
- Defying authority.
- Acts of dishonesty, such as cheating, lying, and stealing. Cheating may be:
  - Copying someone's work to submit as one's own (including class work, homework or other assignments).
  - Giving or receiving answers or stealing tests.
  - O Plagiarizing, i.e. copying other people's material and not attributing it to them.
- Claiming conduct contrary to our rules.
- Written or spoken words that threaten physical harm or damage the reputation of another.

It is understood that while enrolled at DCMS, parents accept responsibility for their student, seeing that students abide by the Christian lifestyle standards at all times, including non-school hours.

Students who violate these standards may be dismissed from school. Students should make every effort to avoid compromising situations, which might give the appearance of being involved in the above activities.

#### **CONDUCT ON CAMPUS**

To provide a wholesome, safe environment, the following behavior is <u>not permitted</u> on campus:

- Speech or words that are negative or contrary to Christian standards.
- Displaying pictures, symbols, or emblems on one's clothing, lockers, or personal property that call attention to groups or movements that are contrary to Christian standards.

- Demonstrating romantic affection such as kissing, hugging, or holding hands.
- Bringing or possessing fireworks, firecrackers, matches, or other flammable materials.
- Bringing pocketknives or any weapons (real or simulated) to school.
- Chewing gum or eating sunflower seeds during school hours.
- Bringing or consuming energy drinks before school, during school, or at school sponsored events.
- Listening to personal music on campus.
- Bringing skateboards to school.
- Tampering with lockers.
- Tampering with or taking items that belong to another student.
- Littering, defacing, or abusing school property.
- Entering faculty areas or restrooms except with specific permission.
- Bringing or using aerosol cans.
- Harassing or abusing anyone verbally, physically, *or digitally*.
- Threatening harm to others.
- Talking disrespectfully to or about another person.
- Treating another person disrespectfully.
- Being in the parking lot except to be picked up or dropped off.

#### CONDUCT IN CLASSROOMS

Teachers establish rules for the classes they teach. However, the following are standards for all classes:

- Students must always respect and cooperate with teachers.
- Students must be on time to classes.
- Students must be prepared with the necessary materials needed for each class. (See Class Materials.)

- Students must have a mental attitude that indicates a readiness to learn.
- Any communication that disrupts the class or distracts students from learning is unacceptable.
- Personal grooming is not permitted during class.
- Students leaving class must have a pass in their possession.
- Food and beverages in the classroom are not allowed.
- Water may be brought into the classroom.
- Students may not be in classrooms or offices unless a teacher or staff member is present.
- The teacher's desk and personal property must be left untouched and undisturbed by students.

#### **CELL PHONES**

Administrators reserve the right to review student phones for behavior management including but not limited to:

- Email
- Texts
- Photos

If a student has a cell phone on campus, it must remain completely powered off and in the student's locker or backpack during school hours.

Students who have phones out or visible (fully or partially) will be charged with a violation of the cell phone policy. Students may not have their phones in their pockets or elsewhere on their person at any time during school hours.

#### Chapel Cell Phone Policy

Cell phones are not to be brought to chapel. Students who have a cell phone in their possession in chapel will be charged with a violation of the middle school cell phone policy.

Cell phones may not be used to serve as a Bible using a Bible app.

#### Cell Phones on Trips

Cell phones are not to be used on school sponsored trips unless specific permission is given

by the teacher or administrator heading the trip.

#### **ELECTRONIC DEVICES**

DCMS desires to foster appropriate use of technology for the purpose of student academic achievement.

- Students will be provided Chromebooks to be used in the classroom when necessary to meet this goal.
- Chromebooks or Notebooks may be used with staff permission in class for school purposes. The device must be on or above the student's desk and in clear view of the teacher.

#### **HOW MISCONDUCT IS HANDLED**

Any matters not specifically covered by the handbook are subject to discipline at the discretion of administration and may cover penalties up to and including expulsion from school. The handbook does not limit the scope of our discipline; instead it attempts to create clarity and consistency.

The discipline policy is available on FACTS. The intent of disciplinary procedures is to encourage students to comply with the conduct standards of the school.

### **ACADEMIC INFORMATION**

#### **CLASS MATERIALS**

Students are expected to be prepared for class. This includes bringing with them the following materials needed in class, but are not limited to:

- Textbook.
- Pens, pencils, and colored pencils.
- Paper.
- Red pen for grading.
- Any required notebooks or journals for specific classes.
- Assigned research materials or other materials necessary to complete class work.

#### TEXTBOOKS AND MATERIALS

All textbooks, workbooks, and materials are purchased by the family. Textbooks are available for purchase from the school. In many cases,

parents are able to purchase textbooks on their own through the school supplied ISBN list. All textbook payments placed on student accounts are due July 15.

Class fees and miscellaneous school charges will be added to student accounts in July and will be due to be paid by August 31.

Students or families may not own copies of teacher's manuals.

#### MIDDLE SCHOOL LIBRARY

Students may check books out from their English teacher. It is the student's responsibility to return library materials on time. Students are charged the cost of replacing books that are lost or damaged. Report cards are withheld until materials are returned or paid for.

#### MATH CLASSES

Middle school students will be participating in IXL Math. Students will gain fluency and confidence in math at their own pace through fun and interactive questions, built in support, and motivating awards.

#### ACCELERATED READER

Accelerated Reader (AR) is a research-based, research-proven reading program that supports literacy growth and achievement by individualizing students reading growth.

#### **HOMEWORK**

All homework relates directly to curricular goals and a variety of activities are used to increase motivation and interest. Reports, readings, handson activities, artistic expressions and projects are all examples of good teaching techniques that help students personalize learning.

The average student should set aside two hours to study and complete homework each day. This standard presupposes that some students will finish in less than two hours and some will take more time.

Many student factors determine the length of time spent on homework. Teachers *often* give time in class to begin homework assignments, therefore student attention and diligence in class greatly impact homework time.

Summaries for homework and lesson plans are posted for the entire week on FACTS ParentsWeb

and become available *each* Monday after 3 p.m. *Teachers may update class assignments and homework in FACTS as the week progresses.* 

FACTS ParentsWeb is a valuable tool in providing parents with general insight into assignments. It is not, however, intended to be a substitute for instruction, details, or modifications to assignments made in the classrooms.

Students are expected to have access to a computer and a good internet connection at home.

Homework and classwork to be shared via the cloud for group work or submission to the teacher must be performed in Google Docs or the appropriate app under the Google Office Products. Students must use their Desert Christian email for such work.

Allow 4-6 weeks for students to adapt to a new grade level and homework expectations. During this time it may take students longer to complete homework.

## LONG TERM PROJECTS

Long-term projects are intended to take several homework days to complete. Therefore, students should avoid procrastinating, but rather plan to spend several days working on the project before it is due.

All long term projects, book reports, term papers, etc., must be turned in on the assigned due date even if the student is absent on that day.

#### LATE WORK POLICY

Teachers may accept late work for 85% credit if turned in within one day of the zero being posted on FACTS. It will be worth 50% credit the second day it is posted on FACTS.

Work that is intended to be done in class may not be done ahead of time as this prevents proper instruction and leaves the child with little to do in class.

## **EXTRA CREDIT GUIDELINES**

Extra credit may be given *in some classes*. Extra credit is not meant to be a substitute for consistent effort on daily assignments and tests.

#### **GRADING AND REPORTS TO PARENTS**

#### **Grading Scale**

In sixth, seventh, and eighth grades the following scale is used in determining letter grades:

# Report Cards

- DCMS uses traditional letter grades for achievement on report cards.
- Report cards are issued at the end of the quarter.
- Parents are welcome to email teachers with questions and concerns regarding student's progress in class.

A grade in a course of study represents the teacher's best judgment of a student's academic achievement. Various components of course work, such as class participation, projects, reports, homework assignments, tests, quizzes, etc. may be assigned different weights by individual teachers.

#### **Progress Reports**

Parents may monitor their student's academic progress on ParentsWeb, a feature of FACTS. By using this feature, parents have the opportunity to help their children bring up their grades before the official report card is issued.

#### **Academic Probation**

Students are placed on academic probation for receiving a grade point average below 2.0 or having two or more F's on a grade card.

A student on probation is assigned a specific period of time in which to demonstrate his/her ability to perform satisfactorily at DCMS. If the student does not perform satisfactorily during that period, he/she may be asked to withdraw from the school and not be allowed to enroll the following year. Students placed on academic probation will be assigned to a guidance counselor to help them succeed academically.

### Re-enrollment and Graduation Policy

Students in sixth or seventh grade who receive an "F" as a quarter grade in more than six classes during the school year forfeit the right for reenrollment at DCMS the following school year and for promotion from their current grade. Students in the eighth grade who receive an "F" as a quarter grade in more than six classes during the school year forfeit the right to participate in the graduation ceremony and for promotion from their current grade. These limits are prorated for students attending less than a full year.

#### ACADEMIC HONORS

The following scale is used in determining qualifications for academic honors: A=4 points; B=3 points; C=2 points.

#### **ACCESS**

• The highest academic honor at DCMS is awarded to students who earn a 3.5 grade point average with no grade below a B.

#### SPECIALIZED TRAINING

#### Christian Training

- Spiritual growth is nurtured within each child. In addition to regular times of sharing God's Word, spiritual principles are integrated throughout the day.
- Bible classes provide opportunities for students to study the Bible and discover its application to their lives.
- Weekly chapel provides opportunities for relevant biblical training and personal expression of faith through worship. Parents are always welcome to chapel and are especially encouraged to attend Character Recognition Chapel for their children.
- Because the Bible is the authoritative basis of the Christian faith, we feel that every person should *adhere to its teachings*.
- Students are taught to apply biblical principles to all life situations, including school, sports, and social interaction.
- Beginning in second grade, each student is required to have the New International

Version (NIV) 2010 Bible for study and memorization.

## Physical Education

- A physical education program is offered that emphasizes the basic components of physical fitness: strength, flexibility, and cardio respiratory endurance.
- In addition to these special physical skills, the development of Christian character traits through cooperative participation in sports and games is emphasized.
- Please refer to the P.E. dress code under the Standards of Dress section of this handbook.

#### Computer Education and Chromebooks

- Middle school students are encouraged to bring their own Chromebook or Notebook to school. Chromebooks are available to check out for day use.
- Middle school students will be issued a school email address to be used for all school assignments. Only the Desert Christian Google account should be used for school work requiring online access, sharing, and online submission.

# Academic Support Program

The Advantage Program offers support to middle school students with diagnosed learning needs.

- Students who are part of this program receive accommodations included but not limited to note taking, verbal testing, organization, and homework help.
- Students need to either have a diagnosed learning challenge or IEP to participate in this program.

# ATTENDANCE POLICIES

Regular, punctual attendance is essential for success as a student. Absences interrupt the smooth and complete process of learning. Students *should only* be absent when absolutely necessary.

#### PARENT RESPONSIBILITIES

• Encourage prompt and regular attendance.

- Schedule doctor appointments and family vacations so that attendance at school is affected as little as possible.
- Email the DCMS attendance clerk Kristie Darwood at <u>kdarwood@desertchristian.com</u> attaching any necessary documentation to report an absence.

#### STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- Regular, punctual attendance in all classes.
- When an absence occurs, the student is responsible for class work missed and must arrange with the teacher to make up assignments, tests, and quizzes.
- If a student misses more than half a class they may be considered absent from that class and may be subject to appropriate grade reductions.

#### **TYPES OF ABSENCES**

#### **Excused**

- The California Education Code section 48205 cites absences due to illness, quarantine, medical services, and funeral services for immediate family as excused.
- Any projects or long-term assignments due during the absence *could be required* to be turned in before the absence.
- The student will be given the same number of days that *they were* absent to complete assignments missed.
- Long term projects or large written assignments may be due before the student's absence.

#### **Unexcused**

- Many other good reasons for being absent may seem legitimate to parents, but are, nevertheless, classified as unexcused.
- Absences beyond 10 days per semester are unexcused without principal permission.

#### Truancies

• Truancies are defined as absences from school or class all or part of the day without authorization from parents or school.

• Absences that are not cleared in the attendance office are also considered truant.

#### Suspension

- Suspension is defined as occasions when a school administrator does not permit a student to attend classes for a specific period of time.
- Suspension may be in school or at home as determined solely by the administrator.

# Consequence for Excessive Absences

- Excessive absences affect academic performance and may result in probation or other consequences assigned by the principal.
- Students who exceed ten absences of any kind in a class for the semester will have their grade reduced by 1% for each successive absence. This excludes absences for extracurricular school activities. In case of an extended illness, parents may submit an appeal in writing to the principal requesting a waiver of this policy.

# STUDENT WORK MAKE-UP PROCEDURE

For all absences, parents and students may retrieve assignments by accessing them in FACTS. Parents should *check both* the lesson plan as well as the homework section. Teachers will set due dates for *work missed because of* illnesses on a case-by-case basis.

#### One or Two Day Absences

- The student will be allowed to complete the work in the same number of days for which the student was absent. (Example: if a student is absent two days, he/she has two days to make up class work, provided the work was assigned during the absence.)
- If a test was given on the day of the absence or assigned prior to the absence, *it will need to be made up.*
- Failure to follow these procedures will result in a zero for the assignment or test and may affect the final grade.

### Lengthy Absences

 In cases of a lengthy absence caused by illness or emergencies, students and teachers will make special arrangements for make-up work. Make-up tests will be arranged with the teacher.

#### Partial Absences

 A student who is present for any portion of a class is responsible for the homework given in class

#### Truancies, Suspensions, and Unexcused Absences

- Students who have been truant, suspended, or receive an unexcused absence will be assigned a penalty by the principal.
- Suspension make-up procedures are identical to one or two day absences (see the previous section.)

#### TARDY AND DEFICIENCY POLICY

It is important that students at DCMS be punctual. Students not only do better in school by learning to be on time, but punctuality is a characteristic of good citizenship in every walk of life.

- Students must be in the classroom before the bell rings *or they will be tardy.*
- If a student is late to school in the morning, a tardy slip must be obtained from the office before reporting to class.
- Students tardy to class and late to school will be tracked separately.

#### **Excused Tardies**

- Some reasons for lateness to school may be excused, such as illness, medical or dental appointments, verified major traffic problems, or a late car pool (unless the tardy student is the cause for the lateness.)
- When excused tardies become frequent, parents may be notified that excused tardies will no longer be permitted.

# **Unexcused Tardies**

• Excuses for lateness not listed in the previous section will not be accepted.

- Excuses such as personal circumstances, illness of a sibling or parent, or car failure are not excused.
- Three "late-to-schools" are given without penalty to accommodate unforeseen events.
   Parents and students should take care to reserve the first three occurrences for these instances since they have no penalty attached to them.

#### **Penalties**

- Late to school and classroom tardies will be calculated together.
- Late to school for medical or dental appointments may only be excused with a doctor's note.
- Students may have four unexcused *penalties* per quarter in each category without suffering a consequence. *Penalties* will be handled in the following manner:

1st occurrence: student notified. 2nd occurrence: student notified. 3rd occurrence: student notified. 4th occurrence: student notified. 5th occurrence: lunch detention. 6th occurrence: lunch detention. 7th occurrence: after school detention. 8th occurrence: after school detention. 9th occurrence: meeting with parent and principal.

- Students will be notified in person and parents by email when a detention has been assigned. Forgetfulness is not a valid excuse for missing an assigned detention.
- Students will not be assigned detention on the same day the tardy occurs.
- To reschedule a detention *contact Kristie Darwood at kdarwood@desertchristian.com.*
- If a student misses detention, the detention will be rescheduled along with an additional detention of the same type.

• Three missed detentions will count as a referral.

# EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Both athletic clubs and after school clubs are part of DCMS extracurricular activities.

DCMS extracurricular activities include all teams, clubs, and organizations associated with the school. Some examples include chapel, worship team, leadership and discipleship groups, sports teams, music groups, and academic teams.

Athletic fees will not be refunded for students who become ineligible for sports or class participation due to discipline or grades.

#### STUDENT ACTIVITIES

The purpose of student activities is to:

- Enhance the intellectual, spiritual, social, and physical growth of our students.
- Enhance the spirit and morale of our school family.

Student activities include off-campus trips such as overnight outings and field trips, and a variety of on-campus activities such as field days and spirit week. Participation in off-campus trips is important since there may be no classes for students on those days.

#### FIELD TRIPS

Single day and multiple day field trips are part of the educational experience at DCMS. Participation in field trips is contingent upon properly registering and paying fees on time. When the field trip involves the entire grade level, classes are cancelled for that grade level and no supervision or alternative childcare is available on campus for those students.

Middle school parents may participate in field trips only when they have completed and been approved in the formal volunteer process.

#### **MUSIC**

Middle school music aims to equip students with the skills and experience necessary for a lifetime of participation in music making while also developing individual character and fostering spiritual growth. *Middle schoolers may join*  music clubs held after school throughout the year.

# REGULATIONS FOR EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The following are general rules governing extracurricular activities that are applicable to all students, whether they are participant(s) or spectator(s).

- All activities are under the supervision of the school, and students are held to the same standards in extracurricular activities as they are in the classroom.
- The school dress code applies to extracurricular activities unless specific exceptions are announced.
- All trip and event fees are non-refundable.
   The first payment commits a student to the entire amount.
- Field trip and extracurricular fees are added to student accounts.
- Students may not participate in any extracurricular activity on the day in which they have been suspended.
- Students excused for any extracurricular activities are responsible for homework in all their classes regardless of whether they attended those classes on the day of the absences.
- Students who begin an extracurricular activity or sport are expected to complete their responsibilities. Those who do not may be considered ineligible for future activities.
- Parents are expected to be on time to pick up their students at all times and from all events, practices, and detentions.
- Any participants that are late meeting a deadline, (such as returning to a bus), will be responsible for paying fees incurred by the school.

# STANDARDS OF ELIGIBILITY FOR EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES INCLUDING ATHLETICS

Student eligibility to participate in all extracurricular activities including clubs, organizations and athletics is determined as **follows:** 

- In order to be eligible students must have a "C" average (2.0 GPA), with no "F"s and must follow school behavior standards.
- Eligibility for fall activities is determined by the grades received for the fourth quarter of the previous year in middle or elementary school.
- To be eligible to participate in any extracurricular activity (including practices), a student must be in attendance at least a majority of the periods of that day.
- Students who try out and make a team are required to pay the full team amount regardless of whether or not they leave the team or choose not to participate.
- The administrator may remove students from participating whose grades or behavior drop during the course of a season or activity. Criteria such as progress reports and reports from teachers will be used to determine if a student should continue to participate.

#### Restrictions for Eligibility

Students ruled ineligible because of grades or behavior are restricted by the following policies:

- If a student is ineligible during a season of his/her sport or activity, he/she is excluded from participation for that season.
- A student's eligibility is determined at the end of each quarter.

#### Attendance and Participation Policy

- A student must attend at least half of his/her classes to participate in that day's activity or athletic experience.
- If a student attends school, he/she should also attend practice, even if he/she does not suit up.
- If a student misses school for illness, he/she cannot attend practice.
- If a student does not participate in P.E. because of injury or illness, he/she may attend practice but not physically participate.

# **ACCESS**

ACCESS is a program for high achieving academic students. "Achievement Centered

Challenge Events for Successful Students" provides unique learning opportunities for students who are excelling in the classroom.

In order to participate students must:

- Be at DCMS one full quarter
- Obtain a 3.5 GPA for the preceding quarter with no C's
- Observe appropriate student behavior standards
- Register on time for scheduled events

#### **LEADERSHIP**

**DCMS** Christian Service is a servant leadership training club available to qualifying 8th grade students. Student need to meet academic and behavior requirements.

#### **READERS'/MATH AUCTION**

A semi-annual summer and fall reading/math program earns students reward dollars that can be spent at award auctions in the *fall and* winter.

#### AFTER SCHOOL CLUBS

Various clubs that focus on individual interests are formed annually. Clubs will be held after school from 2:30-3:30 p.m.

#### INTERSCHOLASTIC SPORTS

DCMS competes with several area schools in cross country, volleyball, soccer, basketball, and track.

The primary goals of the sports program are character development and participation. Families that desire a strong instructional component should enroll in one of the fine community programs intended for that purpose.

Parents and students are expected to remain supportive, positive, and encouraging toward officials, coaches, and players of both teams. Those who cannot will be prohibited from participating or attending.

# Goals for our Sports Program

- Developing Christian character within the athletes.
- Involving students in an activity that will nurture them spiritually, mentally, socially, and physically.

- Demonstrating and teaching Christian sportsmanship: how to win and lose gracefully and work together with a team.
- Involving students in practices and games so they feel they are an important part of the team. (Care will be taken to give each student playing time during the season. However, playing time is determined by such factors as game situations, *degree* of a player's skills, and discipline. Therefore, playing time is not guaranteed for each game and is solely at the discretion of the coaches. Playing time may particularly be limited during tournaments to the extent that some players may not play during each tournament.)
- Developing a positive self-image in students through encouragement.
- Teaching students to understand and accept their individuality; that God loves them as they are, with their abilities and weaknesses.
- Teaching skills and rules of the sport in which the student is involved.

#### General Policies of Interscholastic Sports

- A fee-per-sport of **\$165** is assessed to help cover the costs of various expenses incurred in the program.
- Athletic fees are added to the student account and are due by the start of the first game. Students will not be allowed to participate in athletic activities if the fees are not paid in full by the fee due date.
- Practices are held at the discretion of the coaches, usually three to four days per week.
- Most games are after school. Students may need to leave school early to attend contests.

# **YEARBOOK**

An annual yearbook highlighting student activities is available for purchase each year. The cost of the yearbook will be \$60 and will be added to student accounts. Parents not wishing to purchase a yearbook may opt out.

#### STANDARDS FOR DRESS

Christian schools have a responsibility to establish dress standards appropriate for a Christian

educational setting. The DCS dress code has been designed to provide a comfortable, non-distracting, and appropriate environment for students.

This dress code remains in effect for all school activities and while students are on any DCS campus, including after school and summer.

The administration reserves the right to make final decisions in all dress code or hairstyle matters. If there is any question whether an item of clothing or hairstyle is appropriate, ask the *DCMS office* before the item is worn to school.

# DRESS STANDARDS FOR MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS

All students must appear neat, well groomed, and modest, meaning that clothes must fit well and not be provocative or revealing. DCS takes the view that sloppy or overly casual dress is not conducive to good work habits.

School pride and honor are something we take seriously. School color and spirit days may be announced and observed on special days. Clothing with logos or names of other schools is not proper dress on our campus.

DCS students who are out of dress code are referred to the office. Parents should have a plan in place to bring clothes to their children for resolving any unexpected needs.

#### **Shirts**

All students shall wear an authorized DCS logo polo shirt in an appropriate size that meets the following requirements

- Must not fit tightly.
- May not be altered, gathered, or clipped to adjust the length or width.
- May be tucked in or worn out, according to the desire of the student.
- May wear a plain long-sleeved shirt underneath the DCS logo polo shirts.
- Girls must wear a bra under their shirt.

#### **Pants**

Any type of pants are acceptable that meet the following requirements:

• Must be clean, neat, and properly hemmed.

- Must be worn at the waist.
- Must fit at the waist without the help of a belt.
- May not fit tightly and may not be oversized.
- May not appear excessively faded or worn, and such judgement will be made by administration.
- May not be low-rise style.
- May not be torn, worn longer than the bottom of the shoe, or frayed.

Unacceptable styles include:

- May not have holes or patches.
- May not include leggings, jeggings, or yoga pants worn as pants.
- May not be flannel pants.
- May not be athletic style (including those made of mesh or nylon-type or fleece lined fabrics).
- May not have snaps or Velcro fastening the side of the leg.
- May not be sweatpants, camouflage, or joggers.
- Girl's pants that are not full length must be hemmed to remain below the bottom of the knee when the student is seated.

#### **Shorts**

- Must be a solid color.
- Must be uniform shorts, such as those provided by Land's End, Target, JC Penney, Dickie's, or Old Navy.
- Must be no shorter than mid-thigh nor longer than the bottom of the knee when standing.
- Must fit at the waist and not be oversized or baggy.
- Must not be tight fitting.

#### Skirts, skorts, and jumpers for girls

- Must not fit tightly.
- Must not be shorter than three inches above the knee, including slits.
- May display designs of appropriate subject matter
- May be worn with tights, leggings, and shorts

underneath, no more than three inches above the top of the knee when standing.

- May be made of denim.
- Skorts are permitted.
- May wear a dress in place of a skirt, but must be covered with a school polo.

#### Outerwear, Sweaters, and Sweatshirts

- Logos may include designer brand names, names of colleges, and names of professional sports teams.
- The only outerwear to be worn over a DCS shirt is a coat, jacket, sweatshirt, sweater, or vest.
- Flannel shirts and blouses do not fit the accepted categories and so are not to be worn over polos.

#### Hair

Hairstyles that are out of dress code, as determined by administration, must be corrected before the student may return to school.

- Must be practical. Extreme hairstyles are inappropriate. (Most extreme styles may be avoided by ensuring that length transitions are blended).
- Hair may have no discernible lines other than the parting of the hair.
- Hair length that varies more than 4 inches from the side to the top will be reviewed for being extreme.
- Must be neat, clean, and simple in style.
- Must be kept trimmed, clean, and combed.
- Boy's hair must be a conservative length.
- Boy's hair must be trimmed above the eyebrows.
- Must not be partially or completely shaved.
- Must not be extreme so as to cause a classroom distraction.
- Students who wish to have coloring in their hair other than natural hair colors should limit the coloring to streaking, shading, or smaller areas to avoid extreme hairstyles and distraction. Natural colors include shades of blond, brown, black, or red,

# as they would normally grow. A good rule of thumb is that at least 75% of the student's hair should be a natural color.

- Must be able to see both eyes at once.
- Examples of unacceptable hairstyles include the following: shaved lines, partial or full shaving of the head, any style that can be associated with practices contrary to the school's biblical lifestyle standards, or any style that draws attention to it and may cause a distraction in the classroom.
- Beards and mustaches are not allowed.

#### Shoes

- Must be worn at all times.
- Must be practical and safe.
- Only sandals with heel straps are acceptable; beach sandals are not.
- Shoes with wheels are not allowed on campus.
- Military or work boots are not allowed.

# Makeup and skin art (tattoos, decals, or drawings on skin)

- Makeup on boys is not allowed.
- On girls, makeup must be neat, simple, and modest.
- Acquiring any form of skin art (e.g. tattoos, decals, drawings) is not allowed.
- Students are not to draw on themselves or each other.

#### General

- Hoods may be worn only when outdoors.
- Jewelry must be kept simple.
- Girls' earrings must not be longer than one inch in length or hoop size.
- Clothes worn under jackets must be in dress code.
- No skin should be visible between the neckline and bottom of *the* skirt or pants, with the exception of the arms.
- No part of an undergarment should be visible.
- Face coverings must follow the same acceptable standards as other articles of clothing.

#### The following items or styles are not allowed:

- Jewelry for body piercing may not be visible with the exception of earrings for females.
- Earrings are not permitted for boys.
- Accessories or styles that reflect a negative subculture are not permitted. This is solely at the discretion of an administrator.
- Clothing with the names or depictions of bands, entertainers, or celebrities may not be worn.
- Inappropriate pictures or words are not permitted on clothing worn to school.
   Teachers, administrators, and staff must easily understand the meaning of words or emblems that appear on clothing.
- Clothing that bears the name or logo of groups and movements that clearly oppose Christian principles are not to be worn to school.
- Oversized clothing.
- Military fatigues, trench coats, and surgical wear.
- Company uniforms.
- Items with a skull or bones.
- Items bearing a Confederate flag.
- Clothing worn tightly to the body.

#### **DRESS-DOWN GUIDELINES**

Please follow the guidelines in this section for dress-down days. All other dress code rules still apply.

If you have specific questions about what may be worn on dress-down days, call the school office before the clothing in question is worn. Students may receive Dress Code Violation Notices on dress-down days.

 Athletic wear, such as athletic shorts, jerseys, sweatpants, warm-ups, and jogging suits are not allowed unless specifically stated for a particular dress down day.

#### **Dress Down Shirts**

- Shirts other than DCS polo shirts are allowed.
- Non-revealing, modest shirts will be deemed appropriate.

- On certain days, a school shirt in school colors or spirit theme will be required to dress down.
- Any logos, emblems, words, or phrases on shirts or clothing must be clearly appropriate for a Christian environment.
- No tank tops or spaghetti straps of any kind are acceptable.

#### **Dress Down Shorts**

- Regular style walking shorts that are at least as long as mid-thigh are allowed. The spirit of the rule is to be "closer to the top of the knee than not."
- Tight fitting or baggy shorts are not allowed.
- Shorts may not be longer than the bottom of the knee while standing.
- Cut-offs are not allowed.
- Gym shorts are not allowed.

#### MS P.E. DRESS CODE

Only official P.E. clothes may be worn for P.E.

- Shirts and shorts must be purchased from the DCS student store.
- Shirts Students must wear the P.E. shirt authorized by the school and purchased from the DCS student store. Other shirts are not acceptable for P.E. All P.E. shirts and sweatshirts must have professional lettering of their last names printed on them.
- Shorts Students must wear the P.E. athletic shorts purchased from the DCS student store. The shorts are a black mesh. Other shorts are not acceptable for P.E.
- Sweat clothes During cold weather, students may wear sweatpants and a sweatshirt. The sweat clothes must be purchased from the DCS student store. The sweat clothes must be worn over their PE shorts and shirt.
- DCMS has two options for PE cold weather outerwear.
  - Option 1: black pullover sweatshirt with the PE logo on the front and student last name on the back, black sweatpants with the word Knights printed on the leg.

- Option 2: black warm up jacket and pants with the DC logo and student name on the back, which is available by special order.
- Shoes Shoes must be athletic style with a non-marking sole. *The sole may not exceed* one-inch in height. For safety, shoes must be tied securely.
- Hats with appropriate logos may be worn during P.E.
- Students who forget their PE uniforms may only use the school provided loaner PE clothes. They may not borrow any article of clothing from one another, including shoes.
